The poverty maze

The aim of the game: to escape from the maze with as much money as possible.

Equipment: one maze, two counters, two budget sheets, 24 action cards. It's best to print the different Action (Fundraising and MP notices) and Cost cards on different coloured card, so you can tell which is which.

How to play: the poverty maze is a game for two players. To begin, put the Action and Cost cards face down in separate piles, cut out a counter and write your name on your budget sheet. At the start of the game, you each have a budget of £179. The aim is to leave the maze with as much of this remaining as possible.


Starting from the centre of the maze, you take turns to move one space (marked by a dot). Every time you turn a corner, you have to pick up a card from the Cost pile, and subtract the amount on the card from your budget.

If you're running out of money, you can miss a go and perform an Action instead. Once you've collected either six MP Notices cards or six Fundraising cards, this causes a change in policy and you're both awarded an extra £62 in benefits.

The game ends when one of you leaves the maze. The winner is the person who has the most money left in their budget.
